Retain current nursing workforce through policies and practices that ensure they can provide quality care to individuals, families, and communities

- Foster policies and practices that address racism in academic and work environments
- Foster safe workplace environments that retain nurses and promote professional satisfaction, and protect physical and mental health
- Safeguard the ability of nurses to practice according to the Nurse Practice Act and monitor for modifications that promote and ensure public safety
- Provide for payment structures that accurately reflect the value of nursing practice and compensate competitively
- Advocate for the inclusion of metrics to increase diversity of nursing faculty and students to reflect state demographics
- Expand health resources for LGBTQIA+ community including healthcare access and support, advocacy, and provider competency education.
- Provide adequate funding for nursing workforce professional development and continuing education
- Promote policies for scholarship and debt relief programs for nurses in all practice settings
