What is the difference between a cold and flu?

Cold

Influenza (Flu)

Milder than Respiratory flu illness Caused by different Contagious viriuses

- Respiratory illness
- Contagious
- Caused by influenza viruses
 only
- Worse than the common cold
- Symptoms are more intense

Indirect contact

 Touch a surface, bring into body through eyes, nose and mouth

What can FCC providers do? Take preventive actions:

- Hand washing with soap and water
- Avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects
- Cover coughs and sneezes
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick

RSV

Respiratory syncytial (sin-SISH-uhl) virus (RSV):

- Common respiratory virus
- Causes mild, cold-like symptoms
- RSV can be serious, especially for infants and older adults
- RSV is the most common cause of bronchiolitis and pneumonia:
- in children younger than 1 year of age in the United States

RSV: How does it spread?

RSV can spread when:

- An infected person coughs or sneezes
- You get virus droplets from a cough or sneeze in your eyes, nose, or mouth
- You have direct contact with the virus
- You touch a surface that has the virus on it

- People infected with RSV usually show symptoms within 4 to 6 days after getting infected. Symptoms usually include
 Runny nose
 Decrease in appetite
 Coughing
 Sneezing
 Fever
 Wheezing
 In very young infants, symptoms

- In very young infants, symptoms include:
 irritability,
 decreased activity, and
 breathing difficulties.
 Almost all children will have had an RSV infection by their second birthday.

- NO specific treatment for
- Steps to relieve symptoms:
 - Manage fever and pain

 - Provide enough fluidsProvide medication with completed medication administration permission forms

RSV: Prevention

- Wash your hands
- Avoid close contact
- Clean frequently touched surfaces
